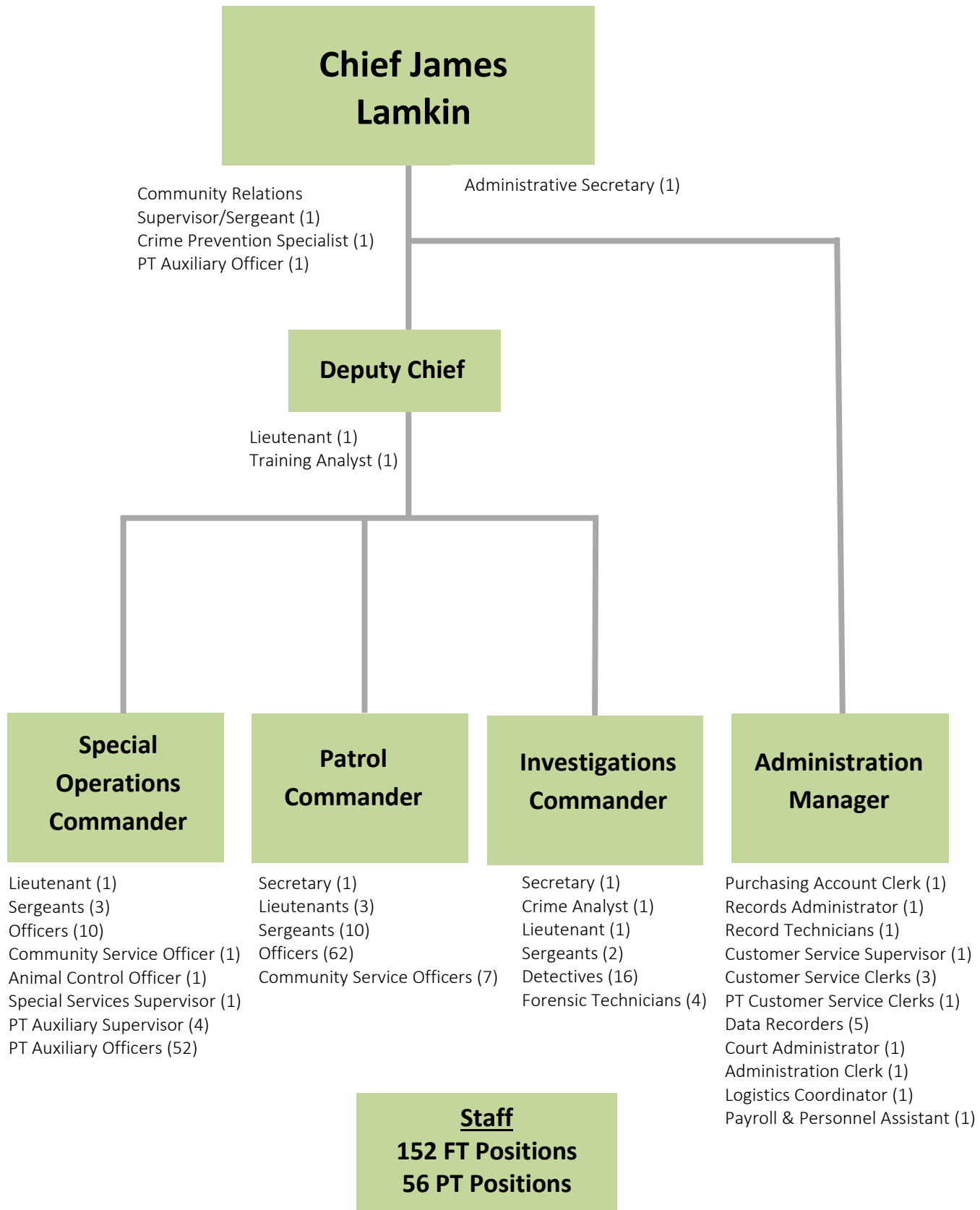

DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Police Department's mission is to "Serve, protect and enhance the quality of life through community partnerships." The Police Department is committed to the philosophy of community policing. By working together with citizens, businesses, schools, community groups, elected officials, public agencies, and other village departments, we can make a difference. The employees are empowered to take ownership over their particular area of assignment, and to be proactive in identifying and solving problems in the community. By embracing the village's organizational values of customer service, respect, trust, teamwork and integrity, public confidence will be maintained.

The Police Department is divided into four divisions, Patrol, Administration, Investigations, and Special Operations, each commanded by a Commander. With a mix of sworn and civilian personnel, an efficient and effective work force is provided. The vision of the Police Department is to "be a model law enforcement agency viewed internally and externally as professional, enthusiastic, trustworthy, and at the forefront of the police profession." The members of the Police Department are committed toward the attainment of this vision.

KEY ACTIVITIES

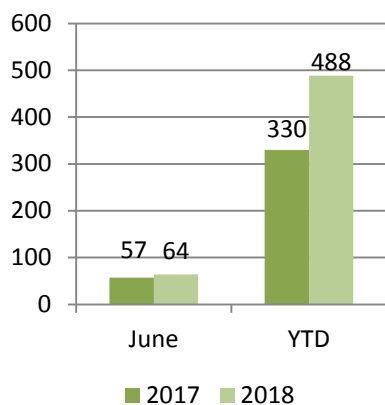
- Detectives assisted the Animal Control Officer after patrol units discovered a Shih Tzu at a residence that appeared in distress. Upon arrival, it was determined that the dog had severe matting and lack of grooming and medical care. The matting caused a self-amputation of his front paw. The owner was interviewed and subsequently charged with the felony. After proper medical treatment, the dog recovered and was taken to an animal shelter.
- Patrol units responded to a residence after receiving a call that an individual was going to commit suicide and had a hand gun. Officers observed the subject walking on the street in a residential neighborhood and carrying what appeared to be a cell phone. The individual eventually complied and surrendered to police. An unloaded gun was found in his waistband as he was taken into custody. He stated his intention was to pull the weapon out and force the police to shoot him. He was transported to the hospital and later charged.
- Tactical Unit officers assisted Patrol and Investigations on a shooting call that occurred on Lunt Avenue. The officers worked closely with the Elgin Police Department and subsequently took one offender into custody.

MONTHLY PERFORMANCE

Adjudication is the process in which a person can contest a ticket that they received; these are the numbers for contested tickets compared to the same time last year.

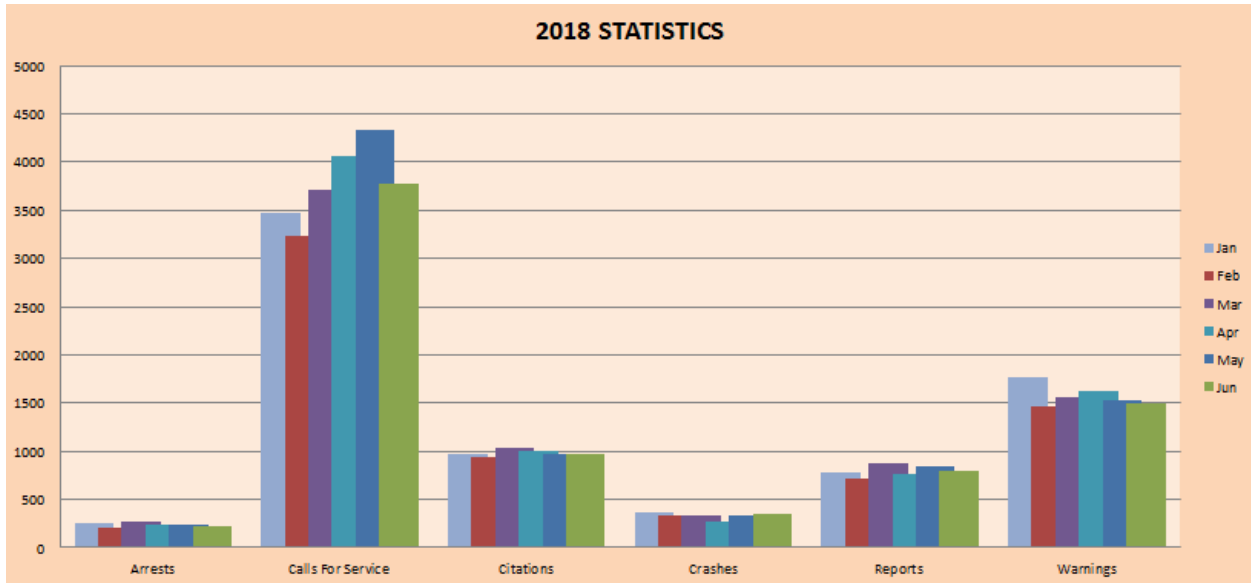

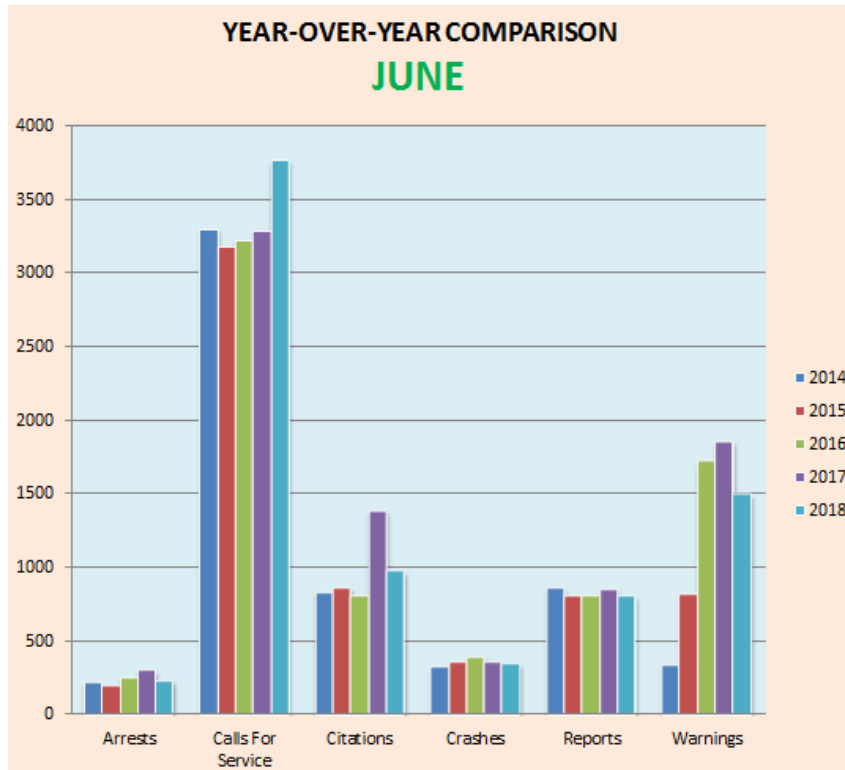
A comparative view of activity from the previous 6 months.

NOTABLE ACTIVITIES

Below are summaries from the Patrol, Investigations, and Special Operations Divisions as well as the Crime Prevention Section for activities that occurred during June 2018.

Investigations Division

- **Aggravated Domestic Battery, Violation of Order of Protection, and Interference with reporting of Domestic Violence** - Officers responded to a fire alarm at an apartment complex. It was determined that the victim had pulled the alarm after her boyfriend had pistol whipped her and took her cell phone. She was able to exit the apartment and then pulled the fire alarm for assistance. The offender was subsequently located and arrested.
- **Burglary** - Officers responded to a motion detection alarm at the Motorola Building. This building is being demolished and had experienced theft of materials in the past. Officers located an offender on scene, cleared and secured the building. Nine canine and handlers from other jurisdictions were utilized due to the size of the building. No other offenders were located. The States Attorney's Office approved a burglary charge after he admitted to being in the building and stealing copper.
- **Battery** - Detectives investigated an incident at a bar in Woodfield Mall. The victim was pushed down after an altercation in the bowling alley. She suffered a broken wrist. There were conflicting stories and the investigation was delayed due to surveillance video not working. Detectives were able to retrieve the video and corroborate the victim's statement. An arrest for battery was made.
- **Liquor Operation** - The liquor compliance detective conducted an undercover operation utilizing underage village employees. Over 20 establishments were checked and found to be in compliance. One establishment served the minor without asking for proper identification. The clerk and business were cited accordingly.
- **Retail Theft Arrests/Compliance Tickets** - Investigations and arrests were made at the following establishments for retail theft- Kohl's, Target, Macy's.

Crime Prevention

The following is a list of projects conducted by Crime Prevention and Community Outreach during the month of June 2018.

Volunteer Program

- During the month of June, police department volunteers provided almost 50 hours of valuable assistance. CPAAAS volunteers assisted Crime Prevention with our Youth Citizen Police Academy.

Presentations

- On June 28, Crime Prevention conducted a senior safety presentation at St. Peter's Lutheran Church to approximately 50 seniors. Topics included telemarketing and home scams.



- Also on June 28, Crime Prevention along with Lisa Bezella from the fire department conducted a children’s safety presentation at Roosevelt University to children in their daycare facility. Approximately 40 children attended.

Miscellaneous

- During the week of June 4 – 8, Community Outreach conducted their first Youth Citizen Police Academy event. Twenty-six teenagers participated in activities such as conducting mock traffic stops and crime scenes, CPR training and forensics.
- On June 11, Crime Prevention conducted a CPTED security inspection at Our Savior’s Methodist Church. A review of the lighting, landscaping and access entryways was conducted and recommendations were made to their administration.
- Crime Prevention participated in the Schaumburg Park District’s Safety Town event on June 25. Crime Prevention discussed children’s safety tips on strangers, 9-1-1 and police officers.

Special Operations Division

With the start of the summer season, Traffic officers have been asked to conduct additional enforcement in the area of the Schaumburg Park District pools. These areas are known to create additional traffic coupled with an increase in children/pedestrian traffic. Results are as follows:

Traffic Unit Officers continue to work on a problem oriented policing project geared toward reducing injury traffic accidents. During the current phase, officers are conducting enforcement on Weathersfield Way between Barrington and Plum Grove Roads. This roadway was selected based on citizen complaints of speeding autos and accident history. Traffic officers work in conjunction with patrol beat officers to conduct enforcement, issuing moving violations and written warnings. The officers were asked to pay particular attention to cell phone and texting violations.

June Enforcement Results – 66 hours of enforcement

- 69 Speeding citations
- 47 Speeding written warnings
- 6 Cell phone citations
- 1 Cell phone written warning
- 13 Other moving/equipment violations

During the month, Tactical Unit Officers conducted fifty-two traffic stops, issuing eight citations and thirty-nine warnings. The officers affected one felony narcotic arrest for delivery/manufacture cannabis. The officers affected one traffic related arrest and one warrant arrest. As a group, they issued seventeen village ordinance compliance citations for drug related activity and/or prostitution offenses. Members of the unit assisted Patrol with sixteen calls for service.

- Throughout the month, the officers have actively engaged in surveillance and routine patrol on the Motorola property. There have been no theft/burglary incidents reported since surveillance was implemented.
- Tactical Unit officers conducted inspections at three massage establishments that had been previously cited for violations. Two establishments were in compliance and a prostitution citation was issued at the third.
- The Tactical Unit conducted carnival worker inspections at the recent Church of the Holy Spirit Family event. Throughout the course of the event, the unit maintained a visible presence at and in the area of the carnival.

Members of the unit are working on an on-going Problem Oriented Policing Project geared toward reducing prostitution activity at the hotels. As a part of that effort, patrol beat officers and tactical unit officers are each assigned to specific hotels and they are responsible for frequent walk-throughs and visits with on-duty staff. The purpose of these routine checks is to reduce potential criminal activity and to build strong working relationships with the hotel management and employees. In June of 2017, hotel checks were completed fifty times by officers. During the month of June 2018, the officers completed 128 checks.

The Search and Rescue Unit will participate in a mock missing person training effort on July 18 at the Schaumburg Park District Merkel Cabin.

Patrol Division

Beat 1 - Sergeant McCartney

Selective Enforcement – Knollwood Drive and Pennview Lane

Beat Projects

Complaints were received about on-going parking and driving issues which have been listed on the beat Directed Patrol Activity list.

Quality of Life Issues

A resident affiliated with Woodbury Place Apartments was the source of calls for service where violence and/or drugs were involved. The Crime Free Multi Housing (CFMH) Coordinator has been notified to contact property management for a response.

The Calls for Service (CFS) in the 2300 block of Bode Road are increasing. The Crime Prevention Specialist was contacted to ensure new owners were aware of, and participate in the “No

Trespass / Loitering” agreement. Additionally, Officer Lopez observed a suspicious person in the lot and upon further investigating he made an arrest for a cannabis control act violation. That subject lives in nearby Woodbury Place Apartments and the CFMH Coordinator was contacted.

A homeless person has been the source for several CFS in the area of Barrington and Schaumburg Roads. The subject refuses to accept any assistance from the Police Department and continues to pile up items to haul around in three shopping carts. A plan of action to resolve this issue to include Social Services and other resources is underway.

Special Watches/Alerts/Missing Persons

505 N. Springinsguth Road / CRC - Traffic Safety Enforcement is in effect in the vicinity of the pool due to increased pedestrian traffic and children in the area until September.

ACO Diamond is handling a CSR completed by a resident complaining of dogs being allowed off leash in Veteran’s Park on Holmes Way during baseball games. The Beat Team is working with her on this until the end of July. No violations have been noted.

Public Service Announcements

Residents do not need to wait, call 911 immediately to report suspicious activity.

Noteworthy Arrests

Officers were in the parking lot area of 1100 N. Knollwood Drive (Woodbury Place Apartments) in response to numerous complaints of possible drug activity. While in contact with a suspicious vehicle, officers detected drug activity and made an arrest.

Beat 2 - Sergeant Kaminski

Selective Enforcement

Beat officers conducted selective enforcement along Weathersfield Way from Braintree Drive to Barrington Road. During the month of June, officers spent 22.45 hours in this area and issued six citations (two for speeding, two for stop sign violations, and two equipment violations).

Beat 3 - Sergeant Tieri

Selective Enforcement

Officers conducting speed enforcement in the area of Braintree Drive and Hartman Drive. This area has been patrolled extensively with very few vehicles observed speeding in the area. Those that were speeding were stopped.

Beat Projects

Extra patrols in the area of the 1000 block of Lunt Avenue reference to a shooting. The offender is in custody, however extra patrols were requested by the beat coordinator.

Beat 4 – Sergeant Paul Christiansen

Selective Enforcement

Salem Drive, between Schaumburg Road and Weathersfield Way.

Beat Projects

Speed violations on Weathersfield Way. Officers are working on a Problem Oriented Policing (POP) Project with Traffic for accident reduction. Sixteen hours were spent in the area resulting in seven citations for speeding, three warnings for speeding, two seat belt citations, one Driving While License Suspended arrest. This effort is to be continued through July.

A complaint of narcotics activity, disorderly conduct incidents in the 900 block of Royal Court was received. This was placed on DPA. No violations observed or reported.

A parking complaint was received for Salem Drive and Hyannis Court. Placed on DPA. No violations observed/reported.

Extended parking permission for a company doing roof/siding work in Sarah's Grove subdivision was approved through December.

A parking complaint reference stop sign at Salem Drive and Weathersfield Way was received. No violations observed.

Parking complaint in the 300 block of Pochet Court. Vehicles blocking sidewalk. Resident advised and vehicles moved. No violations observed since notification was made.

Beat 7- Sergeant Greenaway

Selective Enforcement

Beat officers continued to enforce stop sign violations and speed violations on Perimeter Drive. Officers have also been asked to check the parking lots for burglaries to motor vehicles.

Beat Projects

Officers utilized available time to conduct daily patrols of parking lots, and issued numerous crime prevention forms for valuables left in plain view inside parked vehicles. This month, there were no burglary to vehicle reports and there were two thefts of vehicle parts/accessories.

Quality of Life Issues

Officers are engaging in walk and talks inside Woodfield Mall. This is a high visibility program that receives positive feedback from mall security and mall tenants

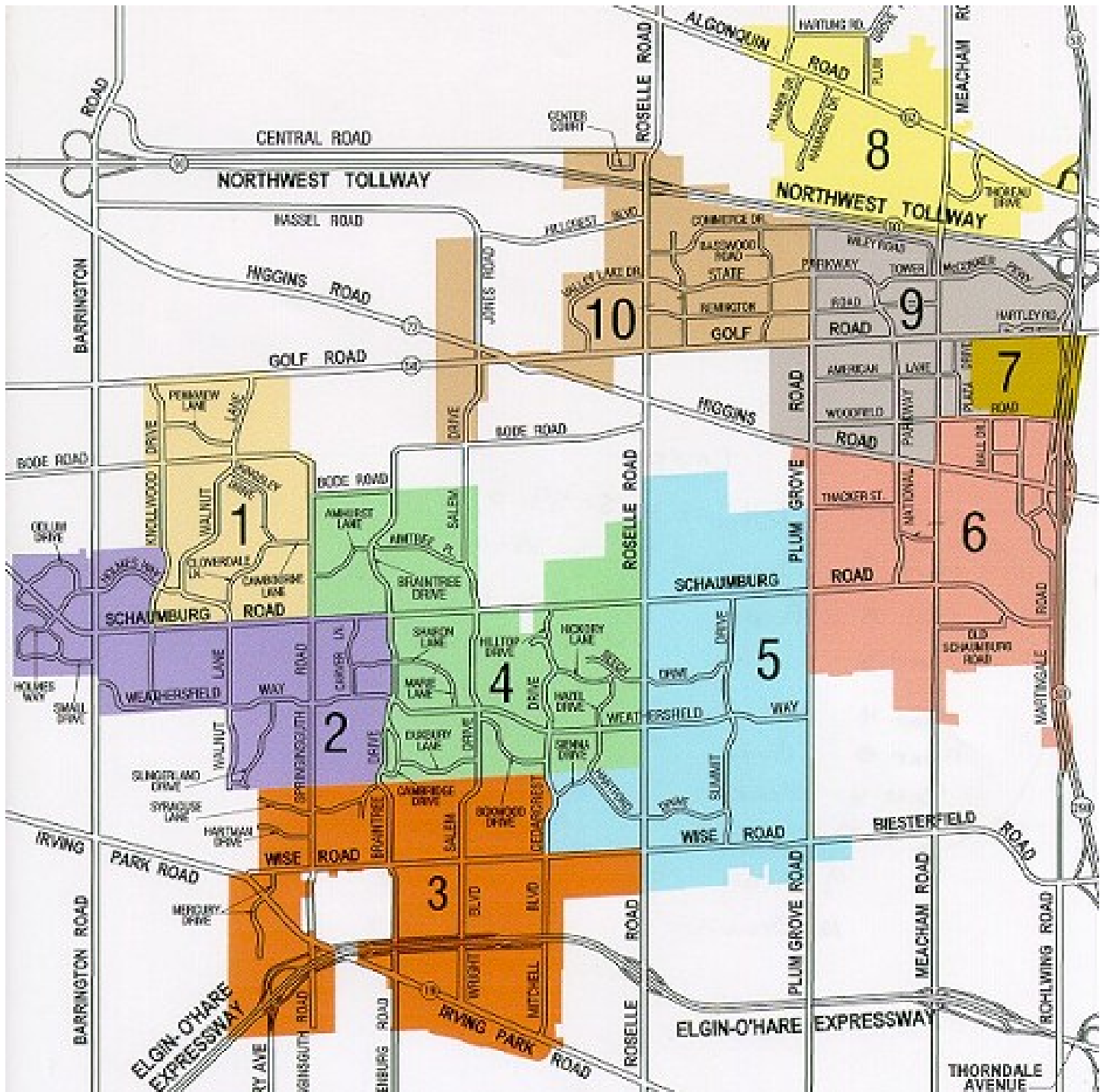
Meetings with Citizens/Organizations/Property Management

There were five separate arrests for cannabis and/or possession of a controlled substance this month.

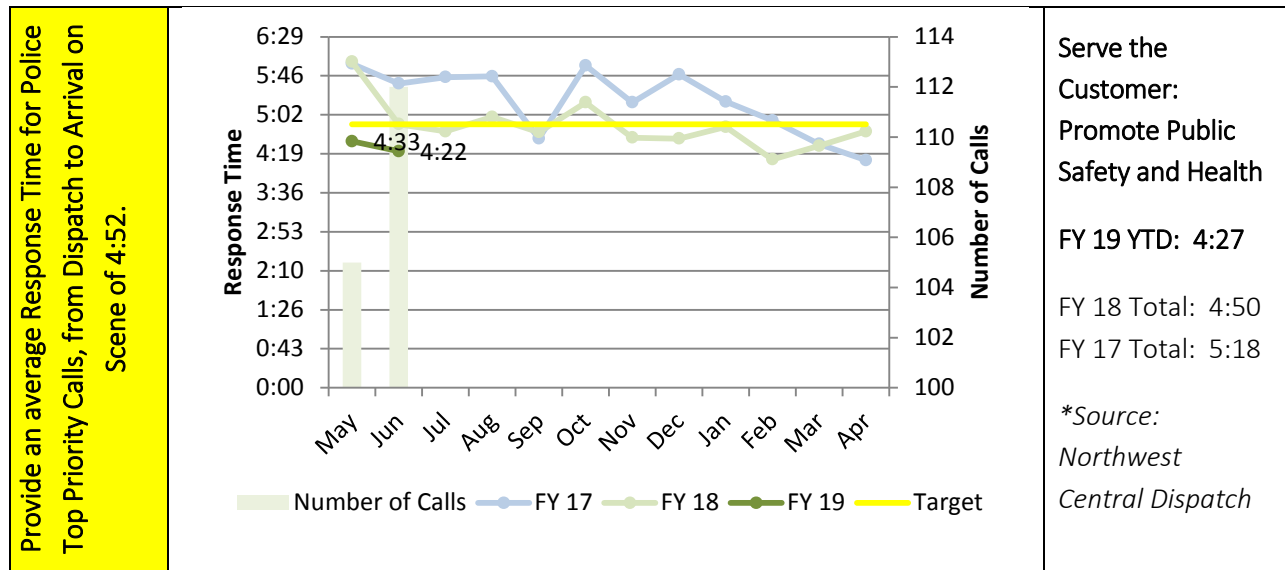
BEAT MAP



KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

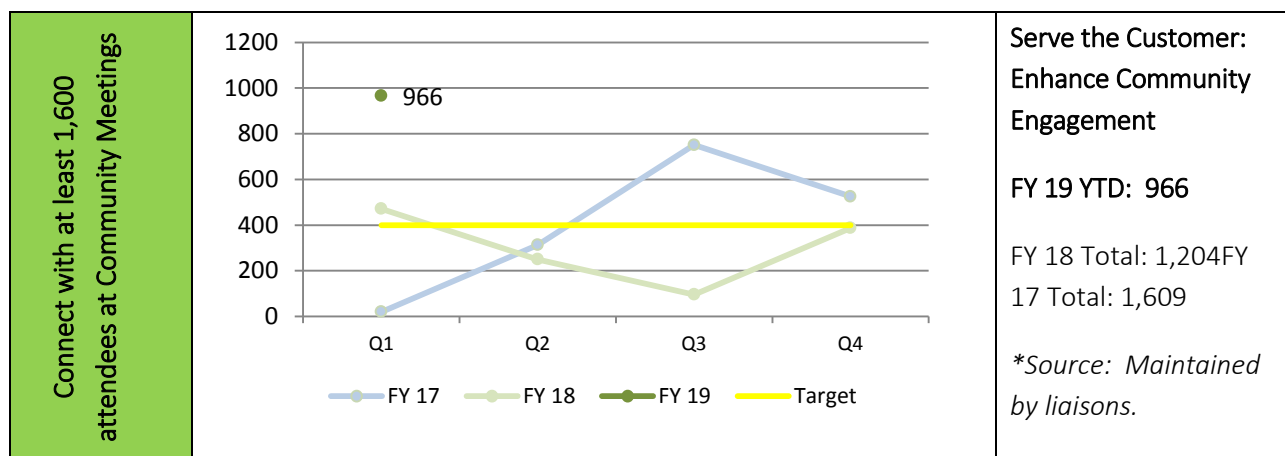
KPI 1: Average Response Time for Police Top Priority Calls

Responding to emergency calls for service is one of the most fundamental services a police department can provide to the residents of that municipality. Providing police service quickly when an emergency occurs is a critical measure of success. This specific performance indicator has not historically been measured in Schaumburg, therefore no benchmark exists. However, our benchmark on this indicator is to maintain current emergency response levels, or to decrease the police response time from year-to-year.



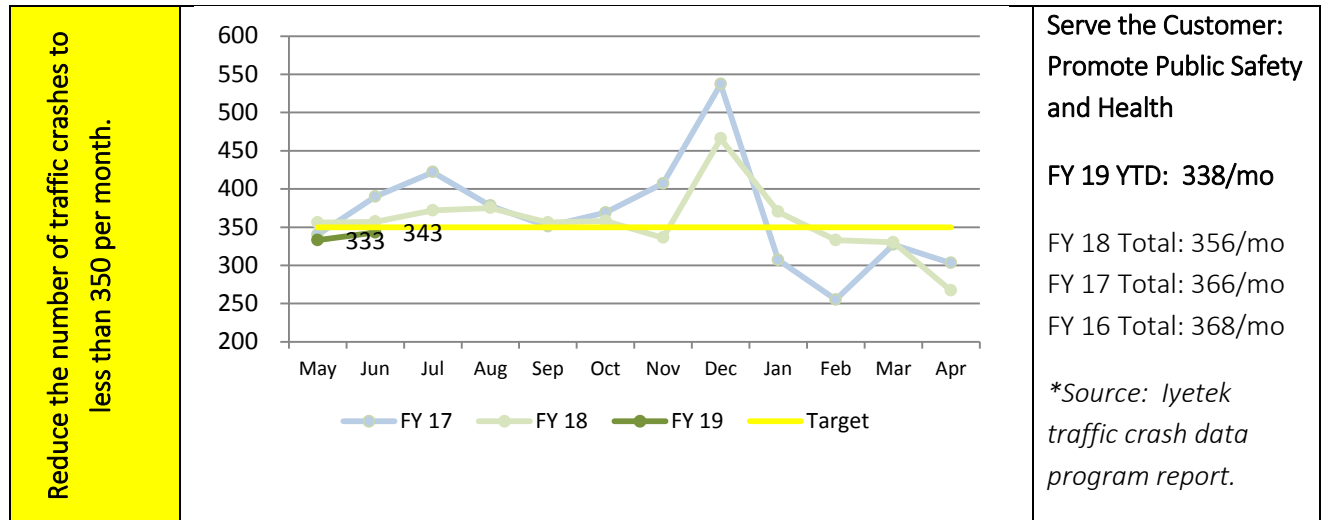
KPI 2: Community Outreach

Given significant local and national events, there is demand for open communication and transparency from the Police Department. By proactively reaching out and connecting with demographic specific targets, the police department can build relationships prior to a potential critical incident involving a member of that group.



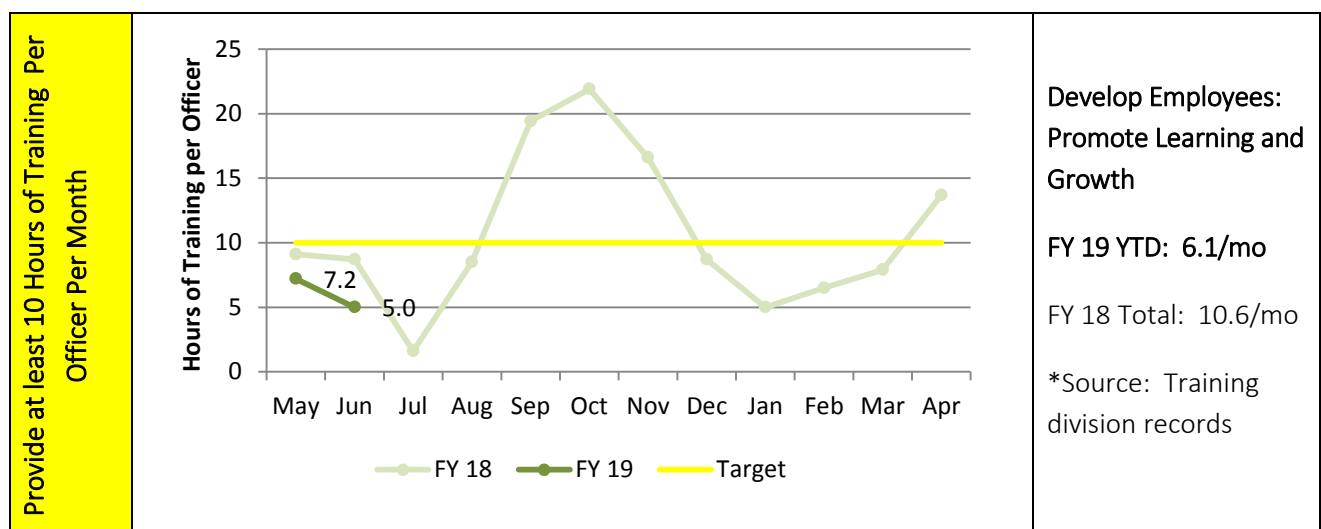
KPI 3: Reduce the number of crashes in the village through targeted enforcement campaigns

Traffic safety is a relevant issue for residents and visitors alike. Unlike violent crime, which is less common in Schaumburg, several traffic crashes occur in the village every day. In order to reduce the number of traffic accidents, the village positions auxiliary officers during peak hours at locations that experience a high volume of accidents.



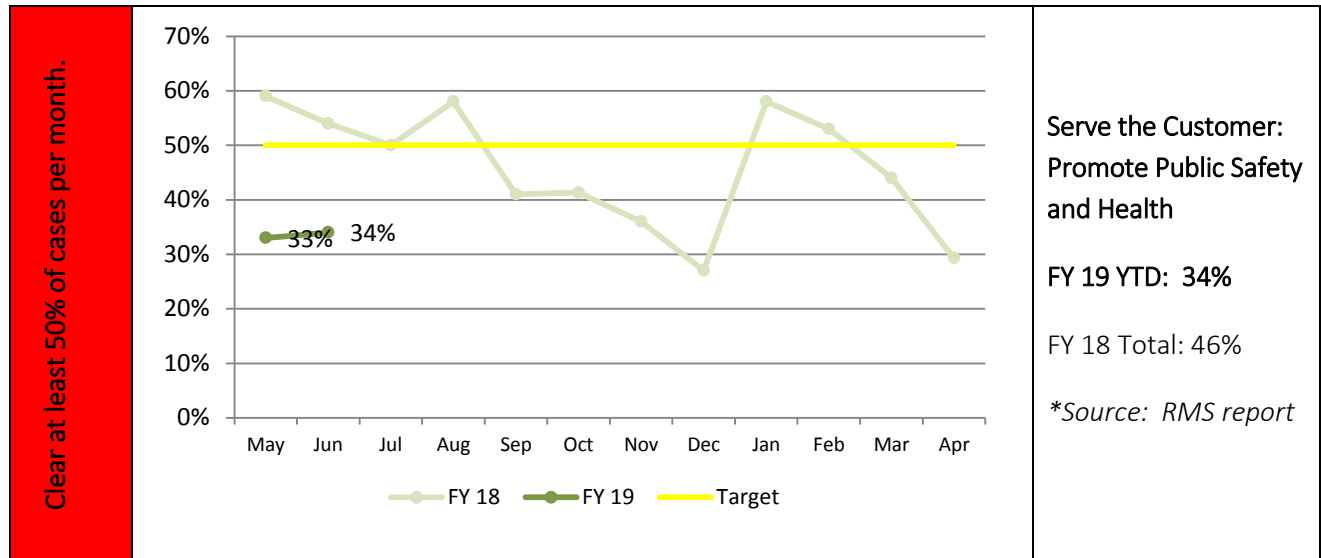
KPI 4: Develop police officers through continued education and training

The department includes internal and external training events and time for each officer. The department promotes external training when available, and builds on training time by conducting additional in-shift training. Further, the department taps into the knowledge of the sergeants and identifies them as subject matter experts in one specific field, to which they can share training on this topic with their shift and perhaps the other patrol shifts as they are able. Additionally, this will enhance the skills and ability of officers and develop leadership skills in the sergeants.



KPI 5: Effectively and efficiently clear investigations

The Police Department will look to maintain the percentage of investigations cleared. We do so by a monthly supervisor review at the command level, to ensure quality. Also documentation of good and bad cases will be made public to enhance training within the unit.



KPI 6: Increase collaboration with the hotel community through continued building checks

Increase hotel building check UCR calls for service, improving year to year from 2016. The department will continue to encourage officers to spend time checking hotels and meeting hotel staff as a way to develop relationships and gain information about potential criminal activity at hotels. This will encompass a growing focus on prostitution and drug activity. Further, officers can act as village ambassadors through the increased presence at hotels, interacting with guests and visitors.
