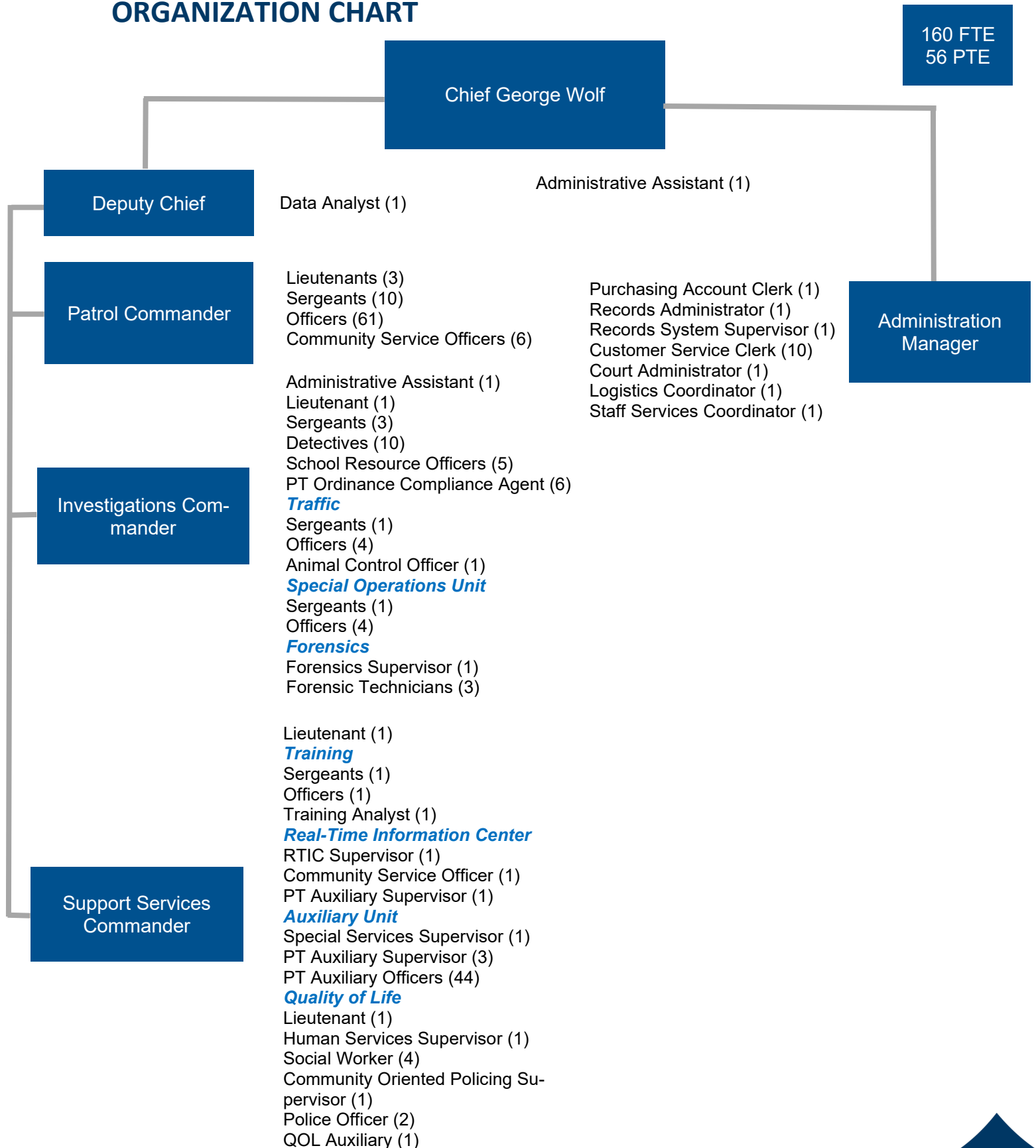


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ORGANIZATION CHART





DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Police Department is committed to the philosophy of community policing. By working together with citizens, businesses, schools, community groups, elected officials, public agencies, and other village departments, we can make a difference. The employees are empowered to take ownership over their particular area of assignment and to be proactive in identifying and solving problems in the community. By embracing the village's organizational values of customer service, respect, trust, teamwork, and integrity, public confidence will be maintained.

The Police Department is divided into three divisions, Bureau of Field Services, Investigations/Support Services, and Administration, each led by a Deputy Chief, with the exception of Administration, which is headed by a civilian manager. With a mix of sworn and civilian personnel, an efficient and effective work force is provided. The vision of the Police Department is to "Be a model law enforcement agency viewed internally and externally as professional, enthusiastic, trustworthy and at the forefront of the police profession." The members of the Police Department are committed toward the attainment of this vision.

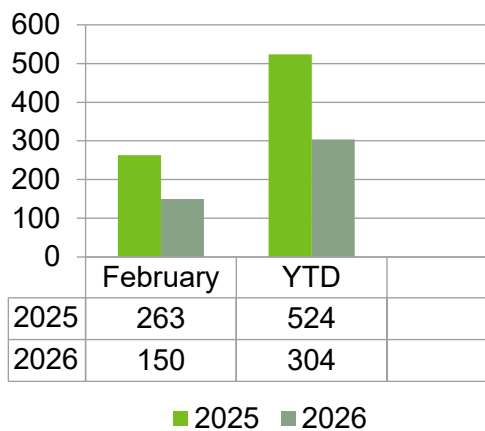


MONTHLY PERFORMANCE

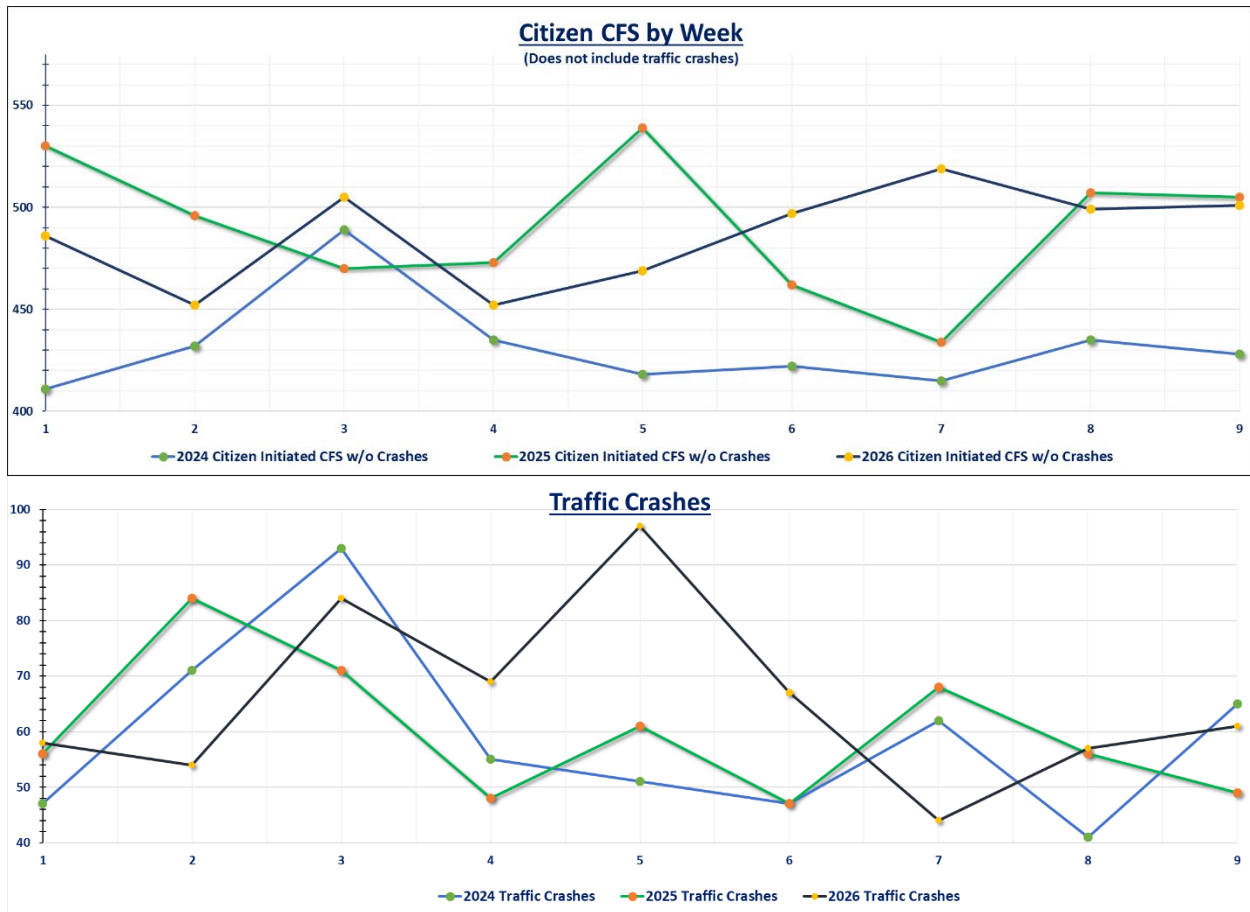
Adjudication is the process in which a person can contest a ticket that they received; these are the numbers for contested tickets compared to the same time last year.

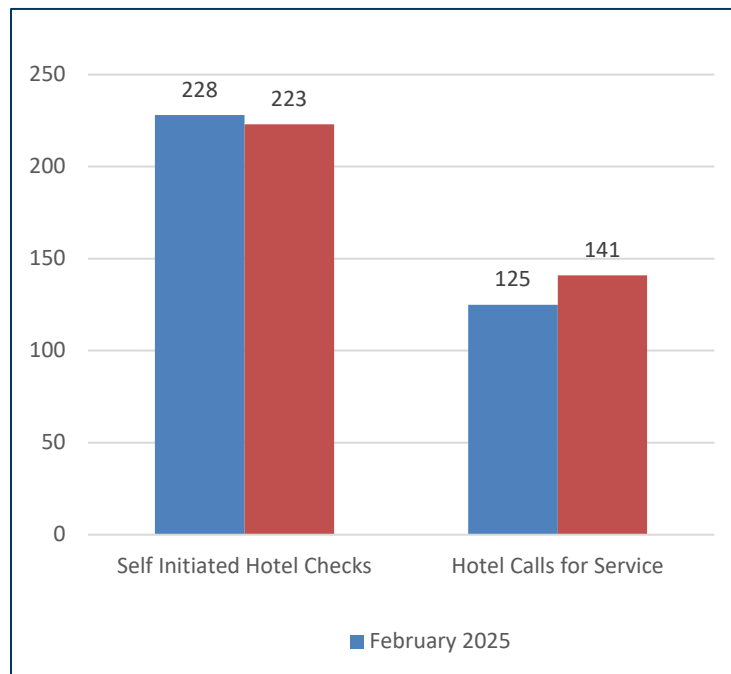
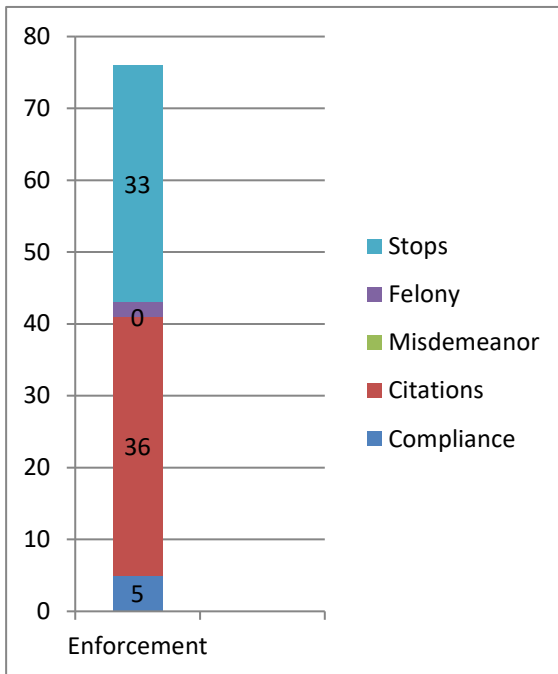


Special Operations Division

Tactical Unit

The Schaumburg Police Department Tactical Unit is a proactive policing unit that deals with pattern crimes and quality-of-life issues that affect the residents of Schaumburg. The Tactical Unit continues its work on an ongoing Problem-Oriented Policing Project with the Patrol Division geared toward reducing potential criminal activity at the hotels. Each officer is assigned a specific hotel where they make frequent walk-throughs and build positive working relationships with hotel staff and management to help reduce the number of calls for service at the locations.

Tactical Unit Activity for the month:





Noteworthy arrests and activities for the Tactical Unit

- TAC officers conducted several prostitution investigations which resulted in one compliance citations directly related to prostitution.
- TAC officers continued conducting hotel checks to get compliance with their camera systems.
- TAC officers participated in a DuPage County “Mission Night” at Hinsdale PD. In doing so they assisted in arrests for Elmhurst and Hodgkins and recovered a stolen auto out of Schaumburg.
- TAC officers conducted an investigation in which they located a suspicious vehicle, ultimately culminating in a Possession of a Controlled Substance arrest.
- TAC Officers participated in multiple catalytic converter theft surveillance operations.
- TAC Officers investigated a local restaurant in a focused fashion, encompassing surveillance, undercover work, and hotel checks regarding possible human trafficking.

Traffic Unit

The primary duty of the Traffic Unit is to improve traffic safety within the Village of Schaumburg through both enforcement, and education of traffic laws. Members of the Traffic Unit also investigate major crashes that occur and are responsible for managing the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) safety and enforcement initiatives. Through its efforts, the Traffic Unit hopes to reduce traffic collisions, facilitate the safe movement of vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians, and expedite the flow of vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

Auxiliary Unit

Auxiliary officers are non-sworn officers that perform a multitude of duties for the police department. Auxiliary officers conduct traffic control, parking enforcement, booking duties, as well as assignments at special events and other community relations functions. Auxiliary officers also conduct valet compliance checks to ensure locations with valet services are following the Village of Schaumburg ordinances.

Patrol Division

- Beat 2 officers monitored the area of Schaumburg and Barrington Roads due to a walk out from a nearby school in Streamwood.
- Beat 3 officers continue to monitor the area of Long Avenue for suspicious activity. There was one possible burglary that occurred but there were no indications a theft had occurred.
- Beat 8 officers continued to monitor the parking issues on Skywater Drive. There were no commercial vehicle/semi-truck cited, nor were any other citations issued.
- In beat 8, officers and detectives interrupted a catalytic converter theft while conducting surveillance. The offenders fled from officers however several stolen catalytic converters were recovered.
- Beat 8 officers continued to monitor parking issues around Arbor and Woodland Drives. There were four citations issued in the area.



- Beat 8 Sergeant Zuhr had his quarterly meeting with the security group at Zurich. They discussed the latest security concerns and ongoing issues in the area developments.
- Numerous directed patrol assignments are in place for apartment complex and hotel establishments regarding catalytic converter thefts.

Traffic Safety

- Sergeant Schmitt created special speed enforcement assignments for the area of Weathersfield Way and Walnut Lane. A special speed enforcement area was also created for Hartmann Drive and Springinsguth Road.
- Officers contacted First Student Bus Company regarding traffic complaints caused by their bus check-in process. They were encouraged to make changes to their process to avoid traffic backups along Wright Boulevard.
- Sergeant Lopez created special speed enforcement assignments for several locations throughout beat 10. Officers are monitoring those areas and conducting traffic stops to address identified speeding issues.
- Officers F. Lopez and Maman conducted a DUI investigation after an accident that occurred in Schaumburg's area of DuPage County. Officers were able to obtain a search warrant, and the offender's blood alcohol content was provided. Officers charged the subject with a felony DUI.

Other Noteworthy incidents

- Officer Grabowski responded to the 700 block of east Schaumburg Road regarding a food truck operating without a permit. The food truck was shut down and not allowed to continue its operation.
- Officers responded to the 400 block of State Parkway regarding a vehicle submerged in a pond. It was determined the vehicle was stolen from another jurisdiction and an unknown subject drove it into the pond.
- Officers responded to the Zurich building regarding a suspicious package. The Cook County Bomb Squad responded, and the package was determined to not be a threat.
- CSO Tribuzio located a vehicle involved in catalytic converter thefts at the Hyatt Regency using the Real Time Information Center. He broadcasted the information and Sergeant Zuhr located the vehicle, preventing a possible catalytic converter theft. The suspect vehicle fled the area.

Real-Time Information Center

The Real Time Information Center (RTIC) provided critical support across a range of public safety operations in both real time and investigative follow-up for 101 incidents and 10 CSRs during the month of February. The most common incidents continue to be traffic crashes and traffic related incidents (42%) and suspicious incidents (19%). Retail thefts fell from 12% in January to 6% of RTIC assists this month. The RTIC was able to locate video or other data which contributed to identification of vehicles or locating involved parties in 71% of the requests made. Six incidents were cleared by arrest. Highlighted incidents from the month are summarized below.

- The RTIC heard a Live 911 call for a domestic where the complainant said her boyfriend would kill her. The RTIC operator located the offender's vehicle driving around the complainant's location and alerted officers. The offender stopped and engaged with officers. He was taken into custody.
- The RTIC identified several car club gatherings throughout the month and alerted officers to disperse the groups.
- The RTIC assisted with locating a missing developmentally disabled person.
- The RTIC operator utilized resources to locate a person reported to have taken a wallet and unlawfully used the owner's credit cards for unauthorized purchases. The person was tracked to a vehicle and the RTIC was able to obtain a license plate for further investigation.
- Officers responded to a call of an armed robbery at an ATM outside of a credit union. The RTIC operator was able to backtrack on video and see that no crime occurred as it was described to the 911 operator. Further investigation revealed that the incident was a swatting call.
- An officer requested assistance to locate a suspect vehicle involved in a hit and run crash. The RTIC operator located that vehicle and was able to provide license plate information to the officer.
- The RTIC heard a retail theft in progress where the offenders fled in a vehicle. The RTIC operator located the described vehicle and broadcast its location to officers. Additional RTIC resources were utilized to obtain license plate information and offender descriptions. The information was shared with outside agencies that located the vehicle and took people into custody.
- The RTIC operator was aware of an in-progress incident in another jurisdiction where the offender fled into Schaumburg. The RTIC operator coordinated with two outside agencies for radio communication. Officers located the offender and took him into custody. A gun was recovered.
- Officers were dispatched to a call of a man slumped over the wheel. The RTIC located video of the vehicle crashing before coming to a stop. Further investigation led to an arrest for DUI.



Police Social Services Unit

The purpose of the Police Social Service Unit is to provide crisis response services for those who come into contact with the public safety personnel or who experience a life disrupting event. The unit is currently staffed by two full-time and one part-time licensed, master's level social workers who provide a variety of services and programs 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The unit serves to decrease repeated police responses, allowing officers to return more quickly to their primary duties, and decrease the risk of an individual committing a crime or becoming a victim of crime.
