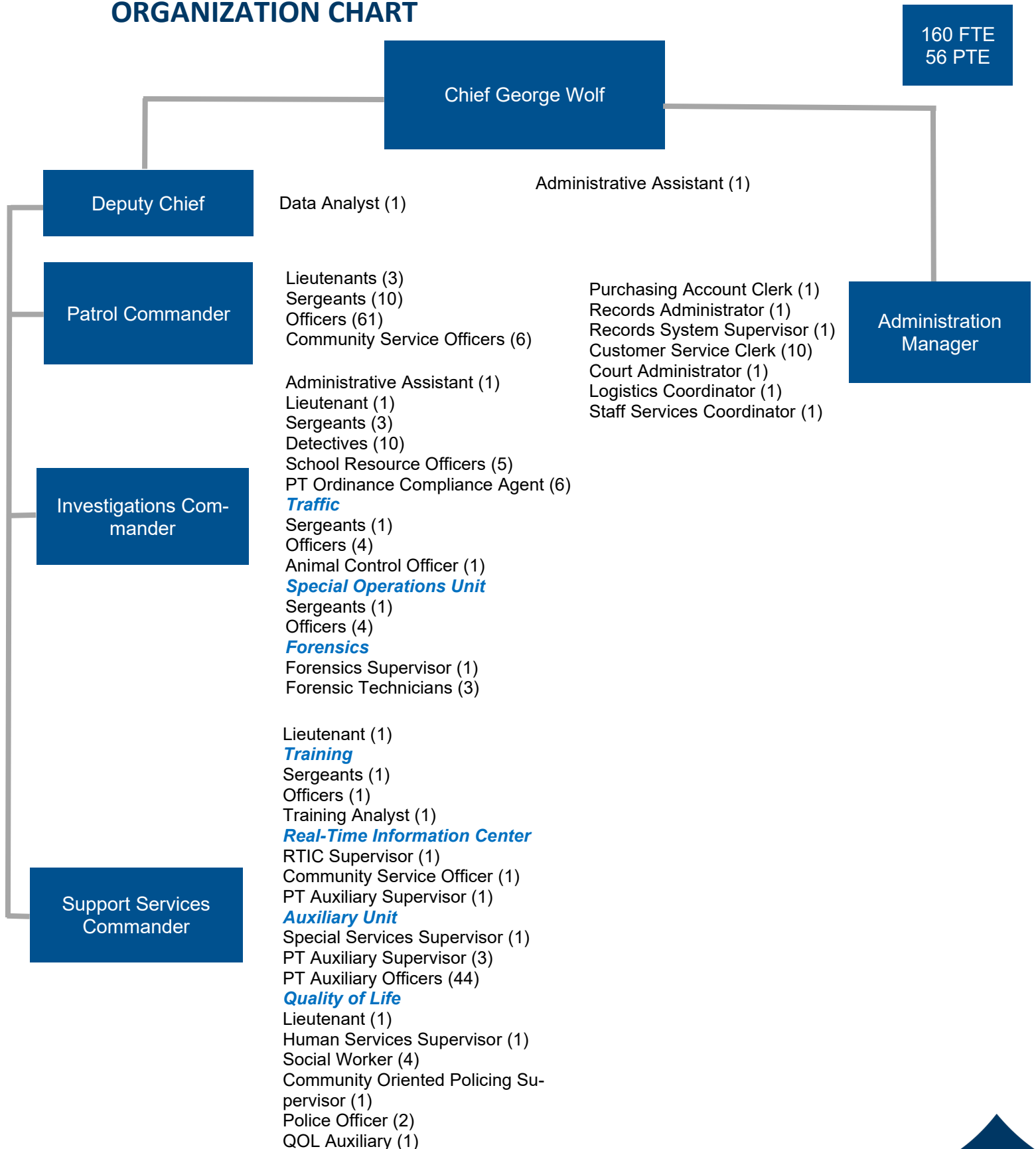

DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Police Department is committed to the philosophy of community policing. By working together with citizens, businesses, schools, community groups, elected officials, public agencies, and other village departments, we can make a difference. The employees are empowered to take ownership over their particular area of assignment and to be proactive in identifying and solving problems in the community. By embracing the village's organizational values of customer service, respect, trust, teamwork, and integrity, public confidence will be maintained.

The Police Department is divided into three divisions, Bureau of Field Services, Investigations/Support Services, and Administration, each led by a Deputy Chief, with the exception of Administration, which is headed by a civilian manager. With a mix of sworn and civilian personnel, an efficient and effective work force is provided. The vision of the Police Department is to "Be a model law enforcement agency viewed internally and externally as professional, enthusiastic, trustworthy and at the forefront of the police profession." The members of the Police Department are committed toward the attainment of this vision.

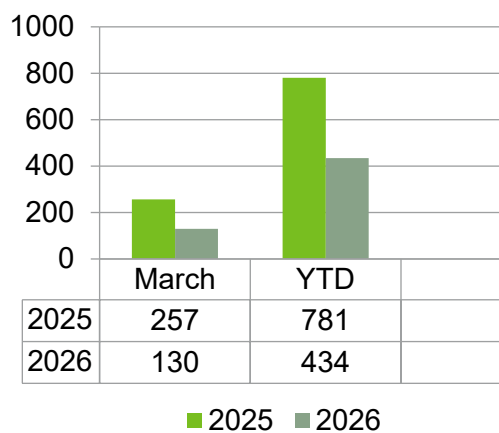


MONTHLY PERFORMANCE

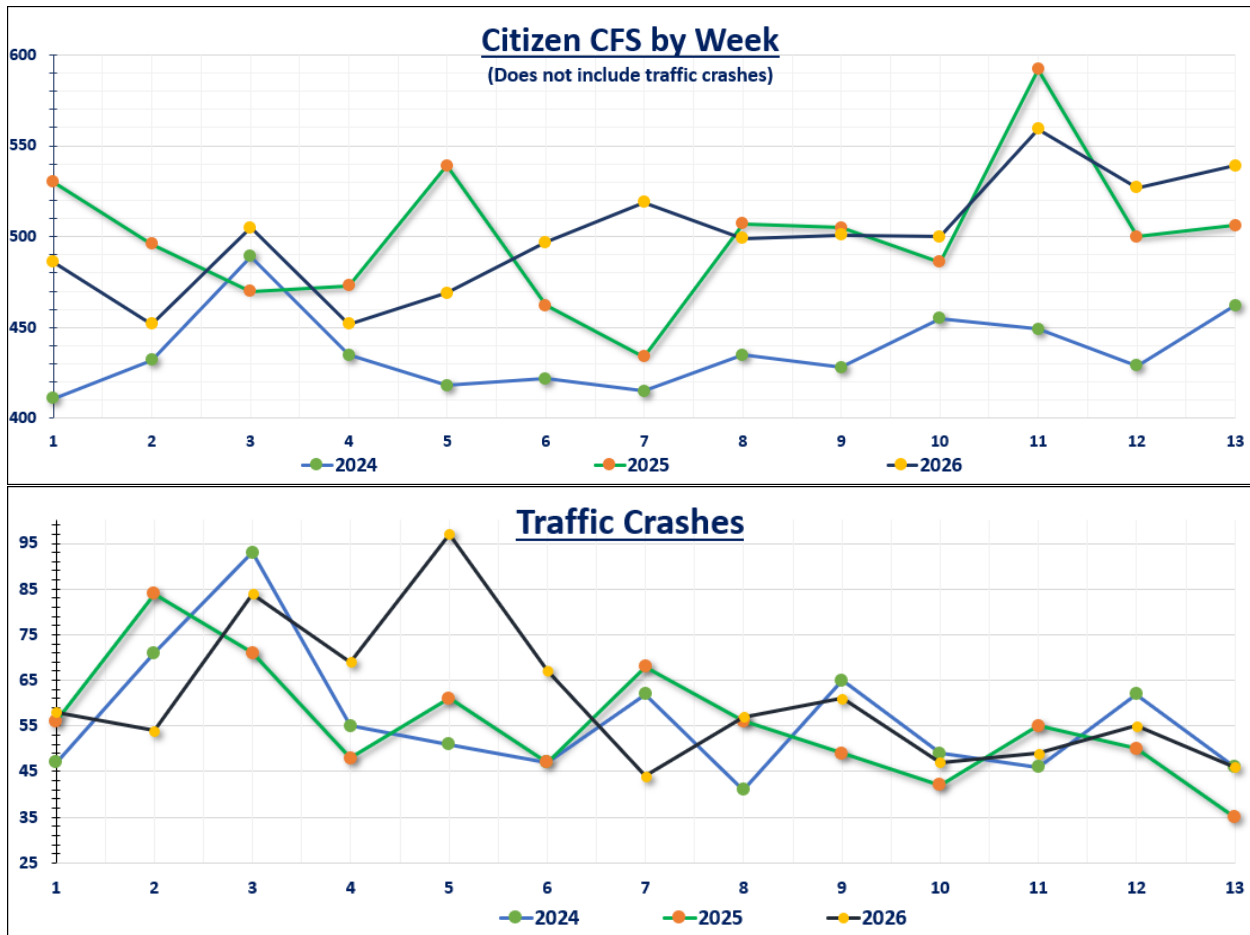
Adjudication is the process in which a person can contest a ticket that they received; these are the numbers for contested tickets compared to the same time last year.

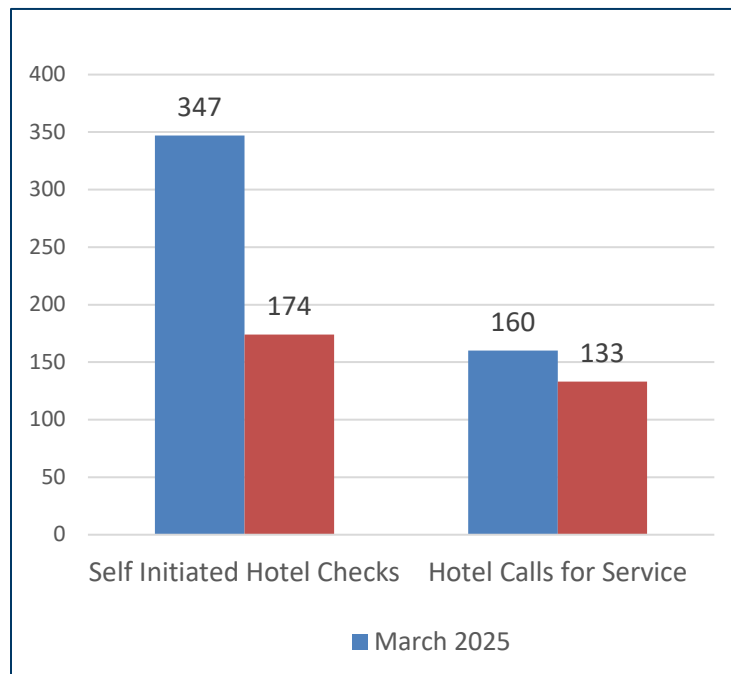
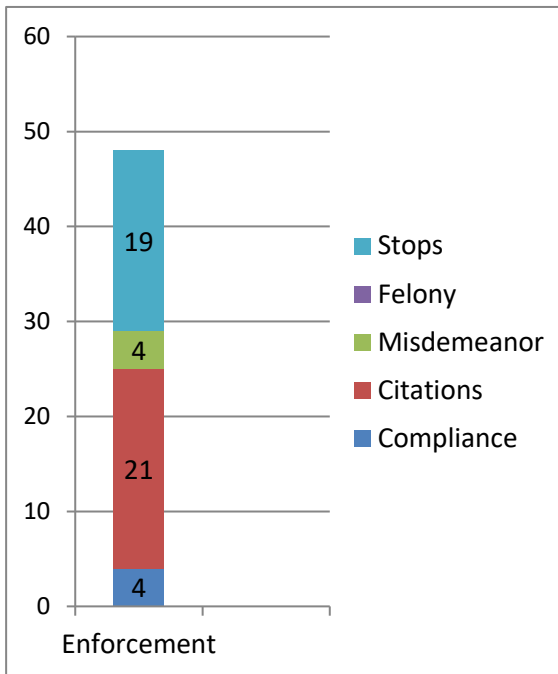


Special Operations Division

Tactical Unit

The Schaumburg Police Department Tactical Unit is a proactive policing unit that deals with pattern crimes and quality-of-life issues that affect the residents of Schaumburg. The Tactical Unit continues its work on an ongoing Problem-Oriented Policing Project with the Patrol Division geared toward reducing potential criminal activity at the hotels. Each officer is assigned a specific hotel where they make frequent walk-throughs and build positive working relationships with hotel staff and management to help reduce the number of calls for service at the locations.

Tactical Unit Activity for the month:





Noteworthy arrests and activities for the Tactical Unit

- Officers conducted several prostitution investigations which resulted in four compliance citations directly related to prostitution.
- Officers continued conducting hotel checks to gain compliance with their camera systems.
- Officers gave a presentation to Citizen’s Police Academy Alumni Association CPAAAS regarding Unit capabilities and goals.
- The Special Operations group took part in the DuPage Mission Night.
- Officers assisted another agency in conducting a search warrant in the 800 block of east Schaumburg Road in reference to an ongoing Fraud/Money Laundering scam.

Traffic Unit

The primary duty of the Traffic Unit is to improve traffic safety within the Village of Schaumburg through both enforcement, and education of traffic laws. Members of the Traffic Unit also investigate major crashes that occur and are responsible for managing the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) safety and enforcement initiatives. Through its efforts, the Traffic Unit hopes to reduce traffic collisions, facilitate the safe movement of vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians, and expedite the flow of vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

Auxiliary Unit

Auxiliary officers are non-sworn officers that perform a multitude of duties for the police department. Auxiliary officers conduct traffic control, parking enforcement, booking duties, as well as assignments at special events and other community relations functions. Auxiliary officers also conduct valet compliance checks to ensure locations with valet services are following the Village of Schaumburg ordinances.

Patrol Division

- Beat 3 officers continue to monitor the area of Long Avenue for suspicious activity. There was no recent suspicious activity reported in the area.
- Beat 4 Sergeant Krok established a DPA at Town Square due to e-bike concerns.
- There was a large protest in beat 4 at the corner of Schaumburg and Roselle. Officers monitored the protest, and no issues were reported.
- Beat 5 Sergeant Guzman was contacted about parking complaints in Dunbar Lakes involving students from Conant. Sergeant Guzman created a long-term directed patrol assignment, notified parking auxiliaries, and contacted SRO Teipel at Conant. SRO Teipel relayed the parking restrictions to the student body. There have been seven citations issued in Dunbar since the beginning of the directed patrol assignment.
- Beat 6 Sergeant Parlberg worked with QOL to reinstate the traffic agreement at Streets of Woodfield. This was essential as there has been an uptick in car club activity due to the change in weather.



- Beat 8 officers continued to monitor the parking issues on Skywater. There were two commercial vehicles/semi-trucks cited.
- Beat 8 officers continued to monitor parking issues around Arbor and Woodland. There were six citations issued in the area.
- Numerous directed patrol assignments continue to be in place for apartment complexes and hotel establishments regarding catalytic converter thefts.

Traffic Safety

- Sergeant Schmitt created special speed enforcement assignments for the area of Weathersfield Way and Walnut Lane. He also created a special speed enforcement area at Hartman Drive and Springinguth. Officers conducted numerous traffic stops and wrote 16 tickets throughout March.
- Sergeant Lopez created special speed enforcement assignments for several locations throughout beat 10. Officers are monitoring those areas and are conducting traffic stops to address identified speeding issues. Numerous citations were issued to speeding vehicles throughout March.

Other Noteworthy incidents

- Officers responded to the vacant Motorola building concerning an alarm. Officers located three subjects walking off the property. They made admissions to being on the property and were subsequently cited.
- Officers responded to Woodfield Mall in reference to a report of a possible active shooter coming to the mall to shoot people. Officers worked with Woodfield Mall Security and determined the report was a “swatting” call.
- An officer responded to a report of a package theft where a witness confronted the offender. A physical struggle ensued, and the offender dropped his phone. The officer located the phone's owner, and he subsequently obtained a confession. The offender was arrested and charged with burglary.
- An officer responded to Skyzone in reference to a burglary of a locker. It was learned that the offender went to local businesses and utilized credit cards stolen from the locker. The officer was able to identify the suspect through the business' check-in process as well as surveillance. The suspect was located and taken into custody.

K9 Activity for March

Detection Deployments

- Vehicle sniff in Arlington Heights. K9 Onyx alerted; no narcotics located.
- Vehicle sniff in Schaumburg. An alert led to the recovery of drug paraphernalia, leading to one arrest.
- SPD jail sniff (12 rooms searched). No alerts.



Real-Time Information Center

The Real Time Information Center (RTIC) provided critical support across a range of public safety operations in both real time and investigative follow-up for 113 incidents and 11 CSRs during the month of March. The most common incidents continue to be traffic crashes and traffic related incidents (42%) and suspicious incidents (19%). Retail thefts fell from 6% in February to 4% of RTIC assists this month. The RTIC was able to locate video or other data which contributed to identification of vehicles or locating involved parties in 65% of the requests made. Five incidents were cleared by six arrests. Highlighted incidents from the month are summarized below.

- The RTIC operator became aware of a hit and run traffic crash in a nearby agency and checked RTIC resources for the offending vehicle. The operator located the vehicle and alerted officers who responded and detained two occupants for the outside agency.
- The RTIC operator heard a Live911 call of a medical emergency in a parking lot and located the person on camera. The operator alerted the officer working a special detail at that location who went to the aid of the caller and directed the ambulance to their location.
- An outside agency requested assistance in locating the offender of a battery that occurred in their town. The RTIC operator located the suspect and their vehicle through RTIC resources and provided the information to the outside agency.
- The RTIC operator viewed recorded footage in an attempt to locate the theft of an e-bike on video. The crime was recorded and the information turned over to investigations.
- A passerby called in a road hazard. The RTIC operator located a large number of nails and screws in the roadway. The operator notified the responding officer and the proper authorities for clean-up.
- The RTIC operator heard a Live911 call of a retail theft offender who fled on foot. The operator located the suspect on camera and alerted officers to their location. The offender was taken into custody.
- The RTIC operator heard a Live911 call for a passenger in a vehicle holding an infant on her lap and the driver speeding on Meacham Road. The operator located the vehicle and aired the location to responding officers. An officer located the vehicle and made a traffic stop finding the infant on the passenger's lap. The driver was taken into custody for having a suspended driver's license and the vehicle towed.



Police Social Services Unit

The purpose of the Police Social Service Unit is to provide crisis response services for those who come into contact with the public safety personnel or who experience a life disrupting event. The unit is currently staffed by two full-time and one part-time licensed, master's level social workers who provide a variety of services and programs 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The unit serves to decrease repeated police responses, allowing officers to return more quickly to their primary duties, and decrease the risk of an individual committing a crime or becoming a victim of crime.
